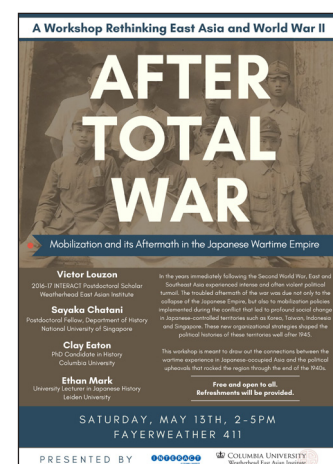


AFTER TOTAL WAR: MOBILIZATION AND ITS AFTERMATH IN THE JAPANESE WARTIME EMPIRE
